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Trust's **Pioneering Programme** provides life saving suicide awareness training

Trust leaders have introduced a pioneering programme focused on suicide awareness in a bid to help save lives, protect pupils and support staff.

In the month that marked World Suicide Prevention Day on September 10th, Nene Education Trust called for schools and education establishments across the county and country to follow its initiative to highlight how help and support is available for students and staff suffering mental health issues. The ground-breaking approach adopted by the Trust, which has seen more than 400 teachers and Trust staff undergo specialist suicide awareness training, was implemented following the death by suicide of Manor School student Callum Woodcroft in 2022.

Callum's former Head Teacher, Matt Coleman, Director of School Improvement at the Trust contacted Northamptonshire suicide prevention charity, Kelly's Heroes to collaborate on creating a package of specialised support available to all eight schools in the Trust, which he hopes will also be utilised by schools throughout the county and nationwide. At the Trust's recent annual training day Sherry Adams, CEO of Kelly's Heroes and the charity's team of specialists delivered the training session entitled Suicide Awareness – Creating A Suicide Safe Community.

Following Callum's death Matt Coleman explained he was determined to help make a difference to support students and staff. He said: "I was driven to make some positive change out of something so tragic that impacted so many.





"We have worked with Sherry and the team at Kelly's Heroes to create a package of support that is available to all schools in the county and beyond. The charity's team of specialists visited the Trust sites to shine a spotlight on this very emotive and often taboo subject, its potential causes, and effects.

" As it is estimated there are more than 700,000 suicides every year worldwide, Sherry Adams welcomed the opportunity for the charity to collaborate with schools and businesses to highlight how it is okay to talk about suicide.

As part of the specially commissioned training provided to the Trust teams, the charity covered: Prevention, Intervention and Postvention and highlighted the detrimental influence of social media has on those struggling with their mental health. Data also showed suicides increase exponentially following the report of a life lost to suicide.

The training covered common warning flags and specific risk factors – influences that may lead to someone to have suicidal thoughts. Chris Hill, CEO of Nene Education Trust, added: "I wanted to express my huge thanks to everyone involved in our training day which was emotional and focused on such important messages."

The Trust's ground-breaking pioneering training was featured by the media with interviews included by the BBC and ITV alongside regional publications.

Jack ran for Wellchild, who support seriously ill children - so again a great cause that is close to our hearts with the roles that we hold.

The runners said that the day was an amazing experience – with lots of support along the whole way. People gave out ice pops, jelly babies, oranges and bands played along the route to keep everyone's spirits up.Both runners completed the course in just over 2 hours which is extremely impressive.

In total they raised almost £1000 between them for the two charities and the support from our community of schools where staff have donated meant that they both exceeded their fundraising goals.

"What I have enjoyed most is the involvement and the fact that you are helping by adding your own experience and knowledge into a pool with fellow trustees to aid the senior leadership, the CEO and his senior leaders to formulate plans for the development of the Trust.

"Primarily, underlying all of that, the whole focus is on the education of the children, to give the young people of our community the best opportunities that we possibly can. All the time spent is all worthwhile because you are putting something back into your community; Mike originally started his role in 1988 as a parent governor at St Peter's C of E School in Raunds where his son Matthew and daughter Claire attended as pupils. Over the years retired banker Mike has held a number of prestigious roles including Chair of Manor School and Vice Chair at Manor Learning Trust, which grew and evolved to become the renamed Nene Education Trust.

One of Mike's most memorable highlights was his involvement in a project to raise money for Manor School which resulted in him helping raise almost £2 million over five years. One of the funded projects was the installation of an all weather floodlit football pitch, which was opened by Sir Trevor Brooking in circa 2008.

CEO Chris Hill said: "We wanted to celebrate Mike's long service success and recognise the many, many years he has given to our schools and Trust."

Mike added: "I think NET is very progressive and foward thinking, it is very community focused and there is a wonderful rapport between the schools."


