
Hannah Turvey, Head of Finance





Trustee talk with **Rob Agnew**

Rob Agnew is a serving Army Officer and joined the Board of Trustees in July 23. Following career experiences across Africa and the Middle East, Rob now works at the Defence Academy of the United Kingdom delivering professional military education in partnership with King's College London.

We spoke to him about his career in the military and his role as a Trustee.

Could you tell me a little bit about your career in the military?

I am a British Army officer and commissioned from Royal Military Academy Sandhurst in 2003, serving in the Royal Corps of Signals before transferring into the Mercian Regiment. Across my career, I have specialised in training design and delivery, as well as leadership and management both in the UK and overseas, including training forces in Iraq, Afghanistan, Kenya and Uganda.

What was it about you and your experience that is suited to being a Trustee?

My experience of planning and risk management help me with my specific role on the Board, looking at risk across the Trust. Working in the military helps you to develop a clarity of thought and an ability to see problems objectively, which are very useful when assessing risk.

Furthermore, my links to education, albeit in a military training environment, provides some synergy, for example the military and the Trust are both subject to Ofsted regulations.

What was it about being a Trustee that appealed to you on a personal level?

Fundamentally, I wanted to use my skillset to give back to society. One of the greatest things about the military is that it is the biggest catalyst of social mobility in this country, which I am very proud of. It helps to train and educate people from any background, allowing them to reach their potential, even those who might have had a bad experience with traditional education.

This role hopefully allows me to help more young people reach that potential, even if that's just through donating my time.



You're also working with King's College London in your current role, is this involvement with further education informing your work as a Trustee in any way?

Our partnership with King's College London is to deliver professional military education to some of the top officers in the country and internationally. It's designed to train the next generation of leaders both within our military and those of our allies.

Training programmes like these help to deepen our common understanding and cultural appreciation of each other which enhances the collective ability to work together more effectively. Teamwork is central to any organisation and a diverse team makes for stronger collaborative working.

Callum's former Head Teacher and Trust Deputy Chief Executive Officer, Matt Coleman has been spearheading the campaign for greater awareness and specialist training to be implemented across the county and beyond. The Trust has collaborated with Kelly's Heroes to help introduce the pioneering programme focused on suicide awareness in a bid to help save lives, protect pupils and staff.

Matt said: "We were delighted as a trust of schools to raise funds for Kelly's Heroes, a charity that is so worthwhile and adds such huge value. The generosity of our families is appreciated – thank you!" Children wore pink on the fundraising day in a nod to the colour used in the charity's branding and logo, making donations in aid of the charity.
